Summer Reading Journal

Throughout the year you have worked hard to train your brain to read actively and think about the importance of what you have read. The brain is a muscle—if you are not using it, it becomes weak and forgets how to work. This reading assignment is designed to help you retain all of the skills you've learned this year. Choose **ONE** of the books below to complete this summer.

As you read the book, keep a journal of what you've read. Identify quotes that stand out to you (be sure to include the page number), and write your interpretation or reaction to them in a separate column. Think about the major works you have read this year and how their themes compare to the ones in the book you read over the summer. You must "get deep" with your annotations and challenge yourself to build connections. Your reading journal should have **25 entries** and should include:

- your insights into the characters and/or the story
- questions that arise as you are reading
- connections that you can make to other texts, the real world, or your own life
- an identification of the themes being developed
- definitions of challenging words
- literary devices being used to enhance meaning
- anything else you want to comment on while reading!

Your journal is due **on the first day of school**. You should either bring a notebook to turn in or a printed out journal that you've typed AND the novel that you've read with **evidence of active reading and notes**.

All The Pretty Horses was written by the American author Cormac McCarthy. This novel gained McCarthy recognition since it was written in a romantic style very different from other of McCarthy's works. It tells the tale of 16 year-old John Grady and his best friend who head south toward Mexico in the year 1949 to find work as cowboys. Along the way, the boys encounter another young boy named Jimmy Blevins who asks for their help. Their decision to help Blevins leads to more adventure than they boys bargained for.

The Giver by Lois Lowry

The novel follows a 12-year-old boy named Jonas. The society has eliminated pain and strife by converting to "Sameness", a plan that has also eradicated emotional depth from their lives. Jonas is selected to inherit the position of Receiver of Memory, the person who stores all the past memories of the time before Sameness, as there may be times where one must draw upon the wisdom gained from history to aid the community's decision making. Jonas struggles with concepts of all the new emotions and things introduced to him: whether they are inherently good, evil, or in between, and whether it is even possible to have one without the other. The Community lacks any color, memory, climate, or terrain, all in an effort to preserve structure, order, and a true sense of equality beyond personal individuality.

Anne Frank: The Diary of a Young Girl by Anne Frank

Discovered in the attic in which she spent the last years of her life, Anne Frank's remarkable diary has since become a world classic -- a powerful reminder of the horrors of war and an eloquent testament to the human spirit. In 1942, with Nazis occupying Holland, a thirteen-year-old Jewish girl and her family fled their home in Amsterdam and went into hiding. For the next two years, until their whereabouts were betrayed to the Gestapo, they and another family lived cloistered in the "Secret Annex" of an old office building. In her diary, Anne Frank recorded vivid impressions of her experiences during this period. By turns thoughtful, moving, and amusing, her account offers a fascinating commentary on human courage and frailty and a compelling self-portrait of a sensitive and spirited young woman whose promise was tragically cut short.

Now Stanley has been unjustly sent to a boys' detention center, Camp Green Lake, where the warden makes the boys "build character" by spending all day, every day, digging holes: five feet wide and five feet deep. It doesn't take long for Stanley to realize there's more than character improvement going on at Camp Green Lake. The boys are digging holes because the warden is looking for something. Stanley tries to dig up the truth in this inventive and darkly humorous tale of crime and punishment--and redemption.
